We thank our two Neighborhood Watch leaders, Guita Farin and David Graue for their help in making WV a safer place – and thanks as well to our Block Captains for getting important safety information out to our community.

In the Business portion of the meeting five Directors (Andy Comins, Don Elliott, Carolyn Saltzman, Roberta Schiller and Greg Severson) were reelected to a new two year term. It was announced that Patrick Walker is unable to finish his term, because he is planning to relocate outside of Westside Village. Therefore, we have two open positions on the Board. Protect Your Home

There are several ways to help protect your property with minimal cost and effort. Remember, most of the intruders DO NOT want to run into residents so creating the impression of being at home—even when you are not—may be helpful.

Nighttime

- 1. Add some outside lighting to your property. Sensor lights can be installed which only come on when an object approaches. They should be put in a place not easily accessible for anyone to manipulate. Our Police department has said many times that intruders will tend to avoid properties that are well lit and expose their presence.**
- 2. Another method of lighting is to have your inside lights, or a substantial light on a timer, and on all night until dawn. This truly does not cause a large expense if you use low wattage bulbs. Intruders tend to think that someone is awake, in the nighttime, if there is a light on that shows from the outside.**

Daytime

- 1. Barking dogs are good at preventing intruders when lights are not an issue. However, not everyone has or wants to have a dog.**

- 2. Music from a radio, etc, can be left on as a sign someone is home.**
- 3. If family members all work and there is an absence of cars in the driveway, sometimes people ask their neighbors to park a car in their driveway to give the appearance that someone is home.**
- 4. "Fake" video cameras are inexpensive and can be installed – they look real and yet will intimidate unwanted intruders.**
- 5. The most important step is keep all doors and windows closed and locked when no one is home. No intruder wants to spend time trying to open a substantial lock or bolt. If there is an accessible gate to a backyard, this should also be kept locked.**
- 6. Home alarms are excellent protection; but of course not for everyone's life style or budget.**

There is no method that provides 100% protection from home invasion robberies; but we all need to give this our best effort to deter this from happening.

Expo Line Update

The Exposition Light Rail Line, or Expo Line, to connect the Westside with the Mid-City and Downtown regions is continuing with respect to construction and planning, and some critical hurdles towards the completion of this major infrastructure project have been overcome. However, as with the 405 freeway project, there are temporary sacrifices that will be unavoidable during construction.

The Expo Line is in two phases, with the first phase to Culver City (with a Venice/Robertson western terminus) being completed and in operation in 2012. There is a possibility that most of the line will be opened late this year to La Cienega on an interim basis, but the full first phase will be in operation by next year.

The second phase of the Expo Line is tentatively scheduled to be in operation 2015-16, and will extend the line westward to Colorado/4th in Santa Monica (near the Third Street Promenade). A contractor was chosen to construct the line (Skanska/Rados), and soil sampling will occur along the rail right of way over the next year with actual construction scheduled to begin in 2012.

Two critical issues were addressed, for which the Westside Village Homeowners Association Board and other local grassroots organizations weighed in with the goal of reducing local impacts on parking and traffic.

First, the Exposition/Westwood station was approved

for a no-parking option instead of the planned parking lot at that site. There are a large number of bus/train transfers to and from Westwood and UCLA anticipated at that site but no actual parking spaces. Instead, a parkway is being planned that will add green space to our neighborhood.

Second, the Sepulveda Blvd. rail crossing will be elevated with a rail bridge so as to not impact north-south traffic flow on Sepulveda Blvd. Councilmembers Rosendahl and Koretz worked with the LADOT to come up with approximately \$5.3 million to pay for this betterment, and it is hoped that more parking can be built at or adjacent to the future Exposition/Sepulveda station because that freeway-adjacent location is expected to be one that attracts more car commuters from West L.A., the Valley or the South Bay.

Sign Up For Cert Training Right Here In Westside Village!

CERT (Community Emergency Response Team) training, like having car insurance, means you’re as ready as you can be to help yourself, your family and your neighborhood in the event of an emergency.

The Los Angeles Fire Department will present this FREE training with a minimum enrollment of 20 people. St. John’s Presbyterian Church at Military and National has generously offered the use of their community room on Thursday evenings. As soon as we have enough confirmed attendees, we can schedule the training.

CERT classes are open to everyone over 18, including those who took the course previously and want to refresh their disaster preparedness skills.

You will learn to:

- **Prepare for emergencies;**
- **Manage utilities and put out small fires;**
- **Treat the three medical killers by opening airways, controlling bleeding, and treating for shock;**
- **Provide basic medical aid;**
- **Search for and rescue victims safely;**
- **Effectively organize volunteers;**
- **And collect disaster intelligence to support first responder efforts.**

The training consists of seven weekly 2-1/2 hour evening classes. If you miss a class, you can go to any other location to make it up. For more information see www.cert-la.com.

Kassemeyer, a former member of the Westside Village Homeowners Association board, whose extensive military service began in 1984 and continued when he was mobilized in April of 2010 for Operation Enduring Freedom, has been awarded many decorations and awards but his recent participation with the elementary school adds a local light on his distinguished service.

Teachers, Principal Germaine England and Councilmember Bill Rosendahl expressed their appreciation to Scott for his service and thoughtful responses to the children's well wishes.

Now back home, Scott continues his Reserve duty and, along with his wife, they continue their volunteer work with service personnel.

Scott has resumed his civilian career as an Ophthalmologic Technician and looks forward to one day becoming a history teacher.
